### Directions to Keystone College

#### From the South or North Via Interstate 81:

Interstate 81 to Exit 194, Clarks Summit; North 8 miles on Rts 6 & 11 to Keystone College. Entrance to the campus is on on your left. Follow the "From the Campus Entrance" directions below.

#### From the South Via Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-476):

Turnpike (Northeast Extension - I- 476); North to Exit 131, Clarks Summit; North 8 miles on Routes 6 & 11 to Keystone. Entrance to the campus is on your left. Follow the "From the Campus Entrance" directions below.

#### From the East Via Interstate 80 and 380:

Interstate 380 to Interstate 80 to Interstate 81 North; 81 North to exit 194, Clarks Summit; North 8 miles on Routes 6 & 11 to Keystone College. Entrance to the campus is on your left. Follow the "From the Campus Entrance" directions below.

#### From the West Via Route 6:

Take Route 6 East through Tunkhannock and continue, merging with Route 11 near Factoryville. Less than 1 mile after the merge, continue straight at a traffic light and the entrance to Keystone's Campus is on your right. Follow the "From the Campus Entrance" directions below.

#### FROM THE CAMPUS ENTRANCE to the PRESIDENT'S DINING HALL:

At the end of the short ramp, turn right onto College Avenue. Take an immediate right into the parking lot. After parking, walk back across College Ave. along a walkway between two Victorian-style buildings. This leads you to the Hibbard Campus Center. Go through the glass entry doors and walk straight to the end of the long hallway. The President's Dining Hall is the last room on your right.
